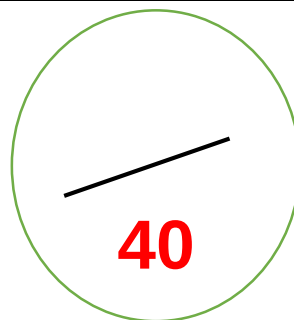

The national anthem is the official song of the country. South Africa's national anthem is Nkosi Sikelel' iAfrika. Our national anthem is in five languages. The first two verses were written by Enoch Sontonga in 1897. The last two verses are from the old national anthem Die Stem van Suid Afrika, which was written in 1918 by C. J. Langenhoven.

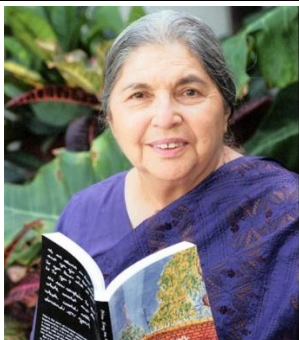

We have learned about **Fatima Meer** and **Pius Langa** and how they have helped shape democracy in South Africa.

Choose one from the two leaders below. Write the name of the leader of your choice as **heading** then choose the relevant information from the jumbled text below to create a paragraph.



He / she was the head of the Constitutional Court from 2005. After acting as a Deputy Chief Justice of South Africa from 2001. **She / he** was a human rights activist, a writer and a political leader. **She /he** was born in Bushbuckridge in 1939, the second of seven children. **He/she** completed his high school education through private study and obtained a B. Luris and LL.B. degrees through the University of South Africa. **He/ she** was born in Durban, in 1928. **His /Her** father was widely respected for **his /her** religious knowledge and he passed on his beliefs of religious tolerance. **He / she** started working for the family owned newspaper, *The Indian View*, on a part-time basis, when **she/he** was still in school. **She / he** was lucky to receive an excellent education and attended university. In 1977 was employed as an advocate and also worked in the Supreme Court and Appeal Court. **He /she** represented the underprivileged, civic bodies, trade unions and people charged with political offences. As an advocate in the 1970's and 1980's **he/she** helped many people who were suffering under apartheid laws.

She /he was active with groups who wanted Nelson Mandela to be released from prison. **He/she** went on to become very involved in the fight against racial and gender discrimination during the time of the apartheid government.

After the democratic elections of 1994, **he/ she** helped to set up a democratic government, justice system and also helped other countries to develop their own constitutions. has received numerous awards. **She /he** became involved in the Passive Resistance campaign while **she/ she** was still in high school. **He /She** participated in the Defiance Campaign in 1952. **She / he** was banned by the government for three years. **She / he** was the founding member of the Federation of South African Women, in 1955. This organisation marched to the Union Buildings in Pretoria on the 9 August, 1956 in the famous anti-pass march. This march is still remembered today as it is a public holiday, Women's Day.

The highest honour given to **him/ her** by President Thabo Mbeki was the Order of the Supreme Counsellor of the Baobab: Gold award in 2008. **His /Her** house was petrol bombed in 1976 when someone tried to kill **him / her**.

..... opened high schools for black students and sent black students to India to study as she focused mainly on education in the 1980s.

He/she retired in October 2009. He died in 2013, aged 74, following a long illness. **She / he** continued to work for women's rights and justice for all, right up to **he/she** died in 2010.

SOURCE D: How people are identified and trained as healers.

Traditional healers are born with a gift for healing. Their ancestors call them to use their healing gift. A person who has a certain kind of illness, or who has certain kinds of dreams, will know that he or she is called to be a healer.

The person called may suffer from strange visions and mental disturbance, even madness. To become a healer, the person must first be cured of this "illness". A practising indigenous healer will take the person through a series of ceremonies. The person may also be given various plant medicines to cure them.

The person called is then trained to be a practising indigenous healer. The healer will train the trainee in the techniques of healing or divining, and of curing illnesses using plant medicines. The training may take months. A traditional healer, a trainee, wears certain clothes and beads.
