DEPTH/SCOPE OF CONTENT

The depth of content refers to the extent to which a topic is focused upon and explored. It helps to enhance the depth of learning as learners develop their content knowledge. It also assists in connecting the relevant content to a learner's real-life experiences.

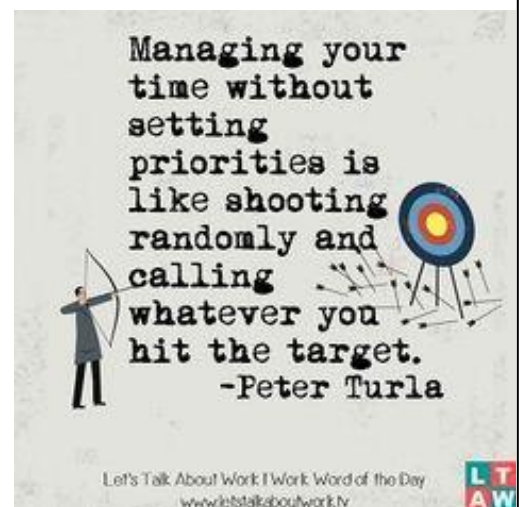
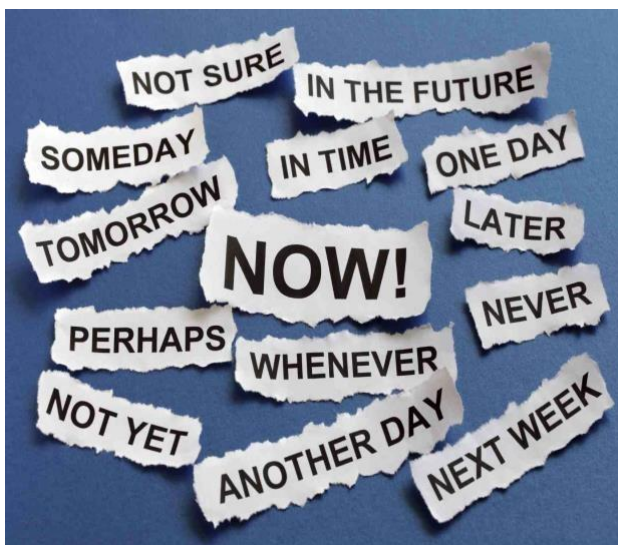

Farmers devastated by El Niño drought

Bloemfontein - It is being described as the worst drought to have hit in 20 years. Five out of the nine provinces have been declared disaster zones as dry conditions triggered by the El Niño weather pattern continue to devastate the country.

Borrie Erasmus, a farmer whose family has worked and lived on the same land in the Free State for the past five decades, told Al Jazeera he had not seen anything like it. "On our farm, there has never been a time that there has not been any maize in December. We could not even try planting seeds. It has been drier than ever," Erasmus said.

The drought is costing farmers more than an estimated R600m in lost crops. While the government says it will be spending R19m on assisting farmers, it also suggested that farmers should start adapting to changing weather patterns.

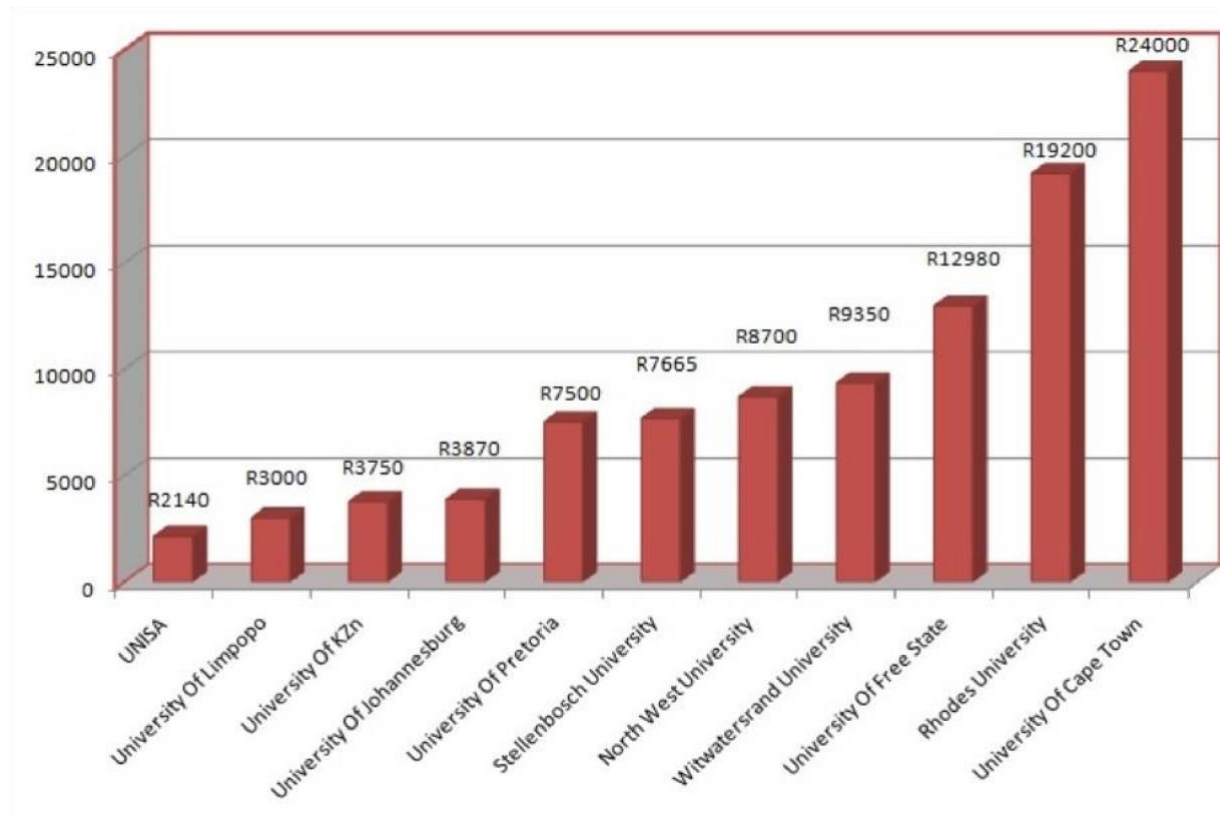

- Parents feel worried about their children. (✓) Social media has many dangers (✓) and they might not be able to protect their teenagers if they are left out (✓).
- Parents are worried about their teenager's academic work (✓). If teenagers are always on their phones, they might not put in the same effort as they should (✓) do less homework / study less (✓).
- Parents may feel that their teenagers do not want them to be part of their conversations (✓) and the reasons for this worried them. (✓) The teenagers may be speaking to someone they should not or looking at something which may be harmful. (✓)

- Do not take messages or calls during important times (✓) like at family meals (✓).
- Set rules as a family for the use of phones (✓) especially regarding privacy (✓).
- Always answer when away from home (✓) and be honest about your location (✓).
- Do not exceed your monthly phone allowance (✓) your parents are more likely to be unhappy about your phone usage (✓).
- Respect your parents privacy (✓) by not reading their messages (✓).
- Switch off your phone when you are studying (✓) so that your parents know it is not distracting you from your studies (✓).
- Ask your friends not to call after hours (✓) e.g. 10 at night/or time that most members of household go to bed. (✓).

- If people behave badly, others would not want to relate/ be associated to them and may start avoiding the sporting event (✓).

3.3 Three possibilities that could have triggered this violent behavior during the sporting event:

- Lack of seating (✓) people sit on other people's seats and get angry (✓).
- Too many tickets are booked (✓) and then there is not enough space for everyone (✓).
- Lack of security (✓) rowdy spectators are not called to order / given warnings (✓).
- Rivalry between opposing fans (✓) often leads to fights between supporters (✓).
- Alcoholism / substance abuse (✓) people who abuse substances are more likely to misbehave / act violently if their team does not win (✓).
- Spectators don't agree with officials' decisions (✓) this could lead to fighting between team members or spectators (✓).
- Betting / bribes - if it looks like a team member is purposely losing (✓). people may have betted and may lose money depending on the outcome of the game (✓).
- Racism (✓) people may see a decision by an official as racist (✓).

QUESTION 4:

Write an essay in which you discuss time management and goal-setting:

- How to set goals for better academic results:
 - Smaller goals help one to achieve bigger goals and builds confidence; to stay focused (✓).
 - Specific: goals must be personal: if they are your own, you will be more committed and work harder to achieve them (✓).
 - Goals must be clearly stated so that you know what specifically needs to happen in order to achieve them. It also makes it easier to record progress (✓).
 - Must be able to Measure your goals: because you can see your Progress (✓). This allows you to evaluate yourself (✓).
 - Must be able to achieve goals (✓). - Goals must be realistic (✓).
 - Goals should be written down: writing it down strengthens one's commitment and reminds you about your goals. (✓)
 - Process goals are better than outcome goals: if we have no control over our goals, they're not good goals (✓).
 - Focus on the process e.g.: commitment, effort, perseverance. (✓)
 - Goals also improve concentration and anxiety. (✓)
 - Goals must have deadlines: the urgency makes the whole process exciting and real. It provides good pressure (✓).
 - Goals should be positive: say what you would like to happen and not what you want to avoid (✓).
 - Measurable goals are best: because you can see your progress. This allows you to evaluate yourself (✓).
 - Goals should be flexible (✓) we must not become slaves to our goals, they should be regularly evaluated and changes should be made when necessary (✓).

 - Give specific time to each section. (✓) So as soon as you finish one section keep that section aside start with the other section and come back to this section at the end if there is time left (✓).
 - You could attempt the paper in whichever way it is convenient to you but the important point being that make sure that you attempt the paper equally (✓) according to mark allocation (✓).
 - Read instructions (✓) and answer work you know best first (✓).
 - Allocate time for each question (✓) so that all questions are answered (✓).

 - Study your difficult subject first (✓) When you are fresh, it is easier to understand and remember. (✓).
 - Study in short time blocks of 20-30 minutes and take a short break. (✓) While you are having a break, your mind will still be processing the information (✓).
 - Be balanced (✓) make time for sport and eat healthy food (✓).
 - Always keep a few summaries of difficult work with you (✓) in case you have to stand in a queue, or wait for a taxi or bus (✓).
 - Prioritize your tasks (✓) so that you have enough time to get to everything (✓).

- How climate change threatens food security:

- South Africa used to be a big exporter of deciduous fruit (✓) but the changing climate effects that fruit production negatively (✓).
 - Fruit trees need a chilling period during winter if they are to flower properly (✓) with rising temperatures, it is not cool enough and trees are no longer producing fruit (✓).
 - Rising temperatures leave Karoo sheep infected with diseases (✓) that is normally only found in warmer areas (✓).
 - Increase of people moving into urban areas (unemployment related to drought conditions) (✓) increases pressure to provide food (✓).
 - If temperatures rise, the amount of rainfall will drop (✓). Farmers will lose their crops which will lead to food shortages (✓).
- Advantages of a bursary:
 - A bursary allows you to study (✓) and to have a secure career (✓). - A career will give you an income (✓) and you can earn money (✓).
 - An income allows you to have a better life (✓) you will be able to provide for your family (✓).
 - Better standard of living (✓) will be able to support a family (✓).

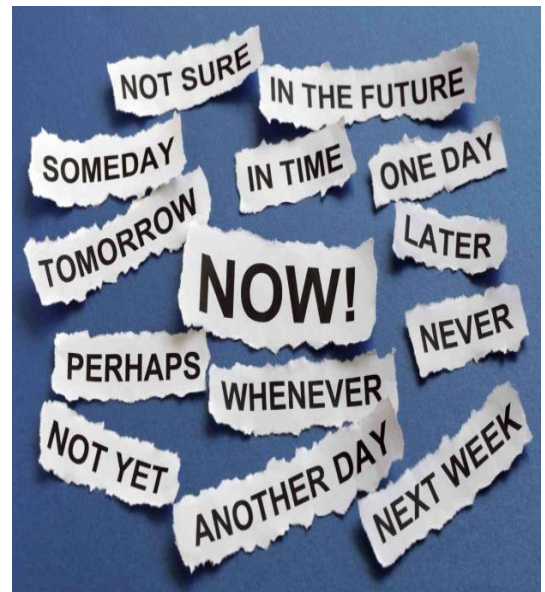

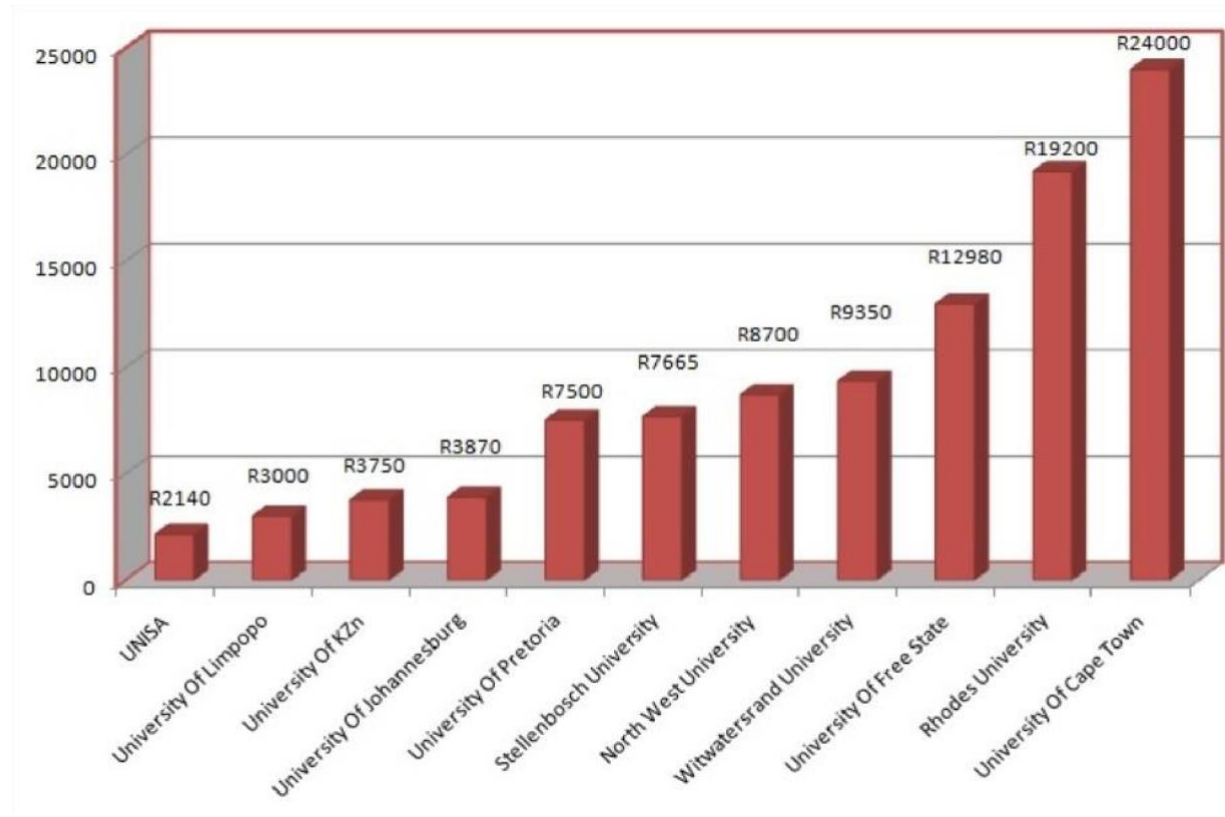

Soccer fans dressed in Chiefs regalia were seen vandalising parts of the stadium and storming onto the pitch after the team lost 2-0 to Free State Stars on Saturday.

A video has been making the rounds of a male security guard, initially thought to be a woman, being beaten by fans.

Seats were set on fire and TV cameras damaged.

Kaizer Chiefs's Vino Maphosa says that while they will be launching a probe into the riot internally, the police are definitely investigating the assault of a security guard on the field.

"This matter has now transcended, it's no longer a matter of football, it's now a security, medical matter that has seriously become subject of an investigation."

Gwala says as police continue with investigations more arrests are expected.

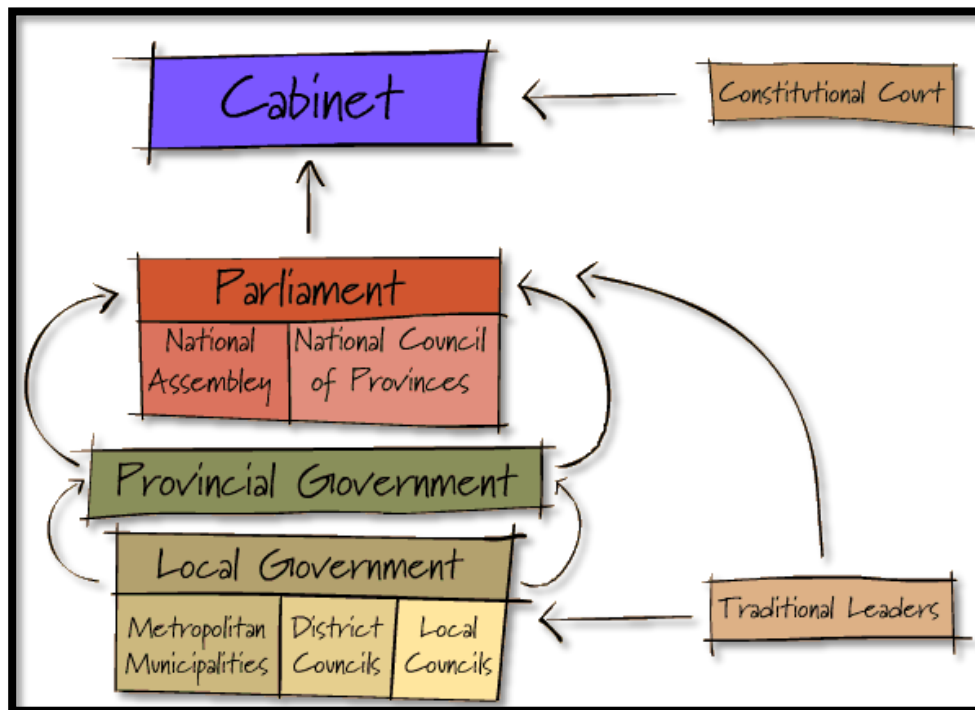

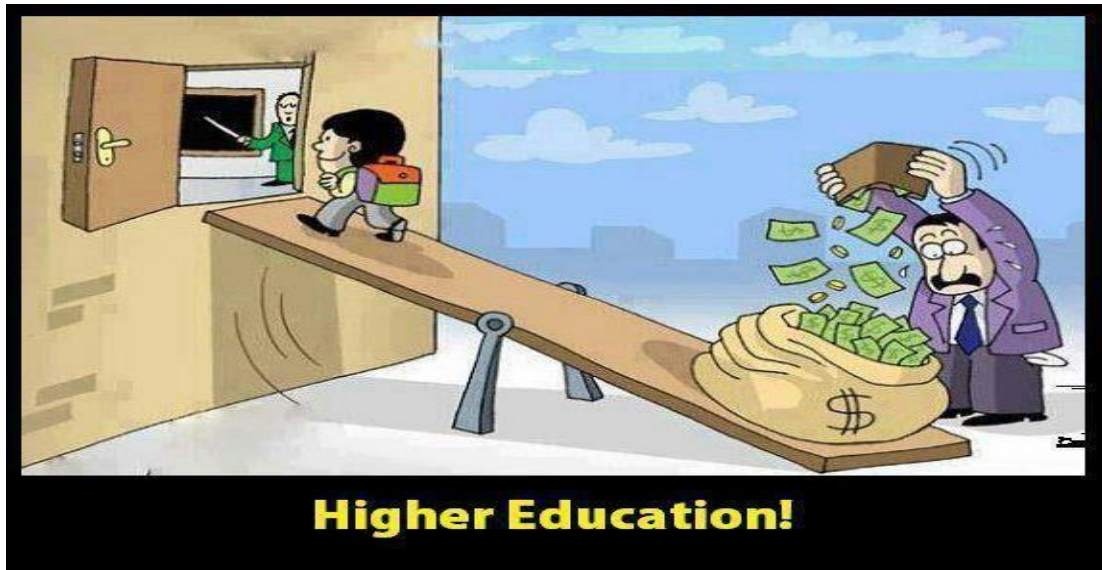

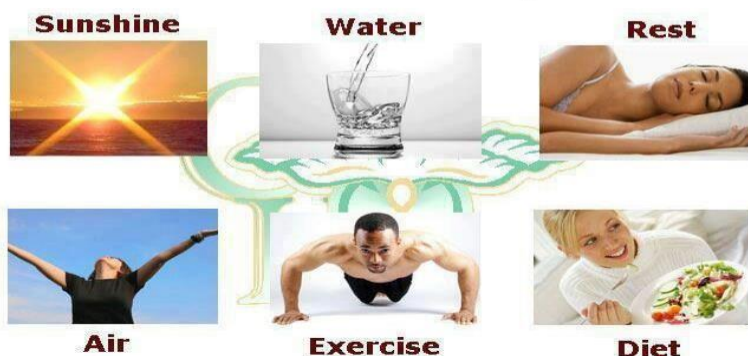

QUESTION 4

Write an essay on the impact of unsafe practices on self and others in which you include following:

- Define personal safety Possible answers:
Personal safety is keeping information about yourself (real name, where you live, personal information, password, telephone numbers) very safe by not giving that to any person,/avoiding to arrange to meet online contact/avoiding dangerous places or walking alone at night (2)
(Well explained definition give full marks)
- Explain THREE characteristics of a healthy and balanced lifestyle
Possible answers:
 - A healthy and balance lifestyle is made up of the following basic parts: psychological, social, emotional and spiritual
 - Well-being is not about being physically well and healthy; it implies that all aspects are balanced with the physical and with each other
 - All life domains are interconnected, meaning all of the sectors fit together (1 x 3 = 3)
- Discuss TWO external factors that have negative impact on your lifestyle choices with regard to accidents and risky behaviour

Possible answers:

- *Accidents*
 - lack of knowledge and skills, such as careful use of wire plugs, paraffin, medicine, or using tools
 - unsafe attitudes and behaviours such as drinking and driving, and doing drugs
 - unsafe environments, like poison caused by medicines and cleaning products that are not locked away
 - muggings and attacks, such as walking at night in unsafe areas
 - emotional factors, which may result in pregnancy due to neglect of condoms

Risky behaviour

- Giving out personal information on social media
- Arranging to meet online contacts
- Walking home late at night in dangerous areas
- Listening to music while crossing the road
- Driving while being distracted by conversations on cellphone
- Drinking alcohol, smoking, using and selling drugs
- Having multiple sexual relationships; sleeping with different partners

- Teenage pregnancy; not using a condom
 - Committing suicide
- (Any 2 suitable answers to be allocated a mark)

Possible answers:

- Illustrate **THREE** factors that can impact positively on your lifestyle choices.

Positive role models - inspire and motivate you to make healthy and useful lifestyle choices

Parents - support given helps with decision making and have positive effect on lifestyle choices

Peers - encourage each other on abstinence and involvement in risky sexual behaviour

Personal values, belief system and religion - have many positive effects on people, including healthy relationship, peace, positive attitudes and improved physical health

Media, social and cultural influence - if critical thinking skills is applied, one can choose to watch educational programmes on TV and upload documentaries on cellphones. Many cultural traditions are based on healthy living and good interpersonal relationships

Economic conditions - if economic conditions are comfortable, one will find it easier to live healthily, get exercise, get health care and take fewer risks.

QUESTION 5

Substance abuse is the incorrect/over usage of substance such as drugs and alcohol

Teenagers are **vulnerable** because they want to experiment/they still struggle with assertive decision making/ making a choice is sometimes influenced by peers

- Since 2003 to 2013 drug abuse has increased.
Explain **THREE** reasons why you think drug abuse has increased
Possible answer why drug abuse has increased
- There is more pressure on teenagers
- Media does not always show the negative effects of alcohol abuse

- Technology makes getting drugs easier.
- SMS or WhatsApp are used if they need info from friends where to get drugs

- Discuss **THREE** ways in which drug abuse by teenagers can impact on the socioeconomic environment of the country.
- Drug abuse can impact negatively on the teenagers' well-being, socially, mentally physically and emotional that would affect their families, friends and parents might be upset
- Their health could be affected which means more teenagers become sick then more medical resources should be provided
- Teenagers might go to jail for stealing or selling in order to get more drugs which impact on the number of youngsters in jail more resources to be provided.
- Cost of drugs are expensive, teenagers steal from their parents/homes to get the money to cover drugs
- Teenagers drop out of school without education which will increase unemployment
- Drug abuse will affect their education which will ultimately result into dropouts who are jobless and suffer in poverty

QUESTION 6

- Explain what is depletion?

Depletion is using most of something or all that was important/lessening /reducing what is so essential (2)

- Discuss **THREE** ways in which depletion of the environmental issues can the impact on the health of the people:

○ Depletion of fishing stock

- Catching of too much adult fish in the sea or dams affect their breeding
- Species or types of fish disappear
- Other fish that are not consumed by humans are caught and thrown away
- In trawling, nets that are dragged along the bottom of the sea kill coral and sea plants
- Dynamite fishing destroys corals and the whole marine ecosystems
- People who rely on fishing to earn a living will not have jobs
- People who eat fish as their essential food wouldn't have enough and will suffer from malnutrition

(Full marks for well explained answer) (3)

○ Deforestation

- Many people rely on firewood for heating and cooking, they will not be able to keep warm and cook
- Some types of trees could become extinct
- No trees will exist to bind the soil, leading to soil erosion and floods
- There will be no shade to keep people and animals cool
- Birds will migrate further in search of places to live
- Alien plants will take over, and they need more water and grow quickly
- Global warming and climate change will take place as there will be no trees to absorb carbon dioxide and give off oxygen

(Full marks for well explained answer)

○ **Water pollution**

- Water polluted by mud from the soil can carry viruses and bacteria that can cause disease in fish and people
- People may eat the diseased fish and become ill
- Chemicals emitted by industries can poison water and make the water too acid to drink or use in watering crops
- Lead and mercury are toxic to the fish in the lakes and rivers
- Untreated sewage that flows into rivers can spread diseases such as diarrhea, cholera and typhoid fever
- Too many fertilizers and too much manure poison water

Reducing deforestation

- Promote the planting of indigenous flora, and get rid of alien trees and plants

- People should get involved in monitoring the quality of water in their community
- Ensure that non-degradable waste is not thrown in the sea or rivers (4)
